

# Manhattan's Most Dangerous Roads

128 pedestrians were killed on Manhattan streets in the three years from 2005 through 2007. Tri-State Transportation Campaign's analysis of federal traffic fatality data reveal that 3rd Ave, Broadway, 1st Ave, 7th Ave and Amsterdam suffered the highest number of pedestrian deaths over the period.

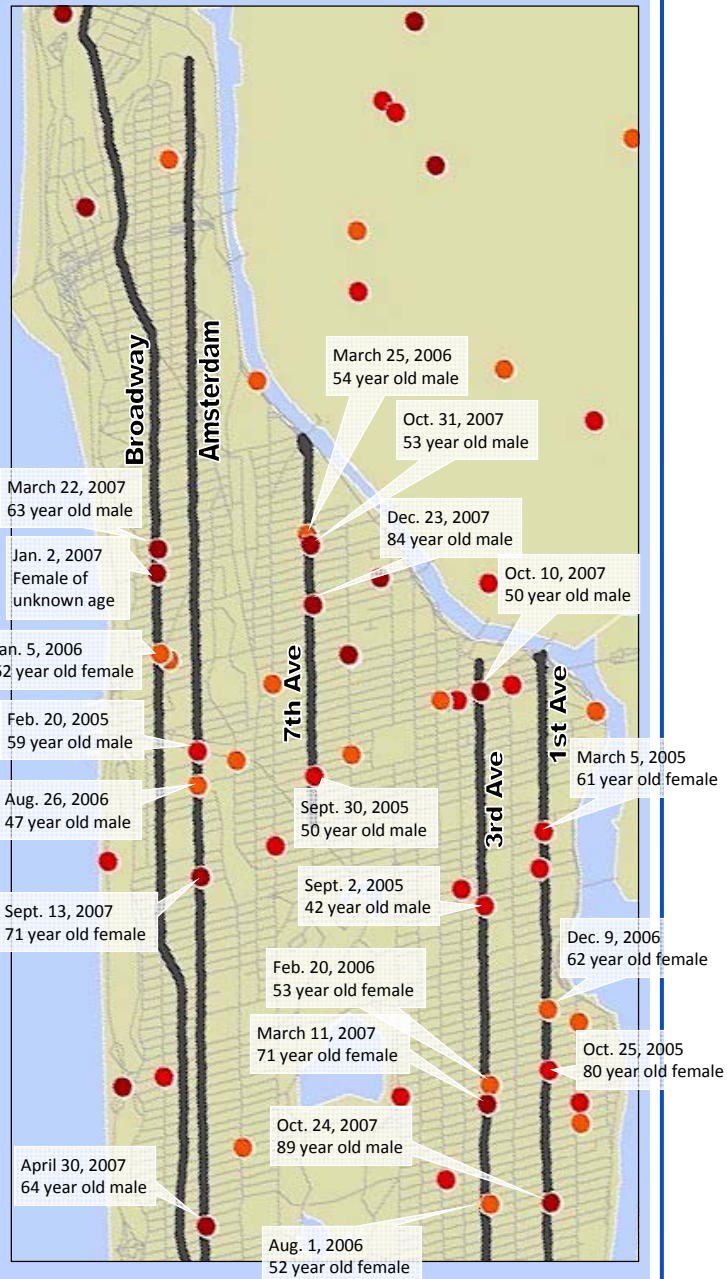
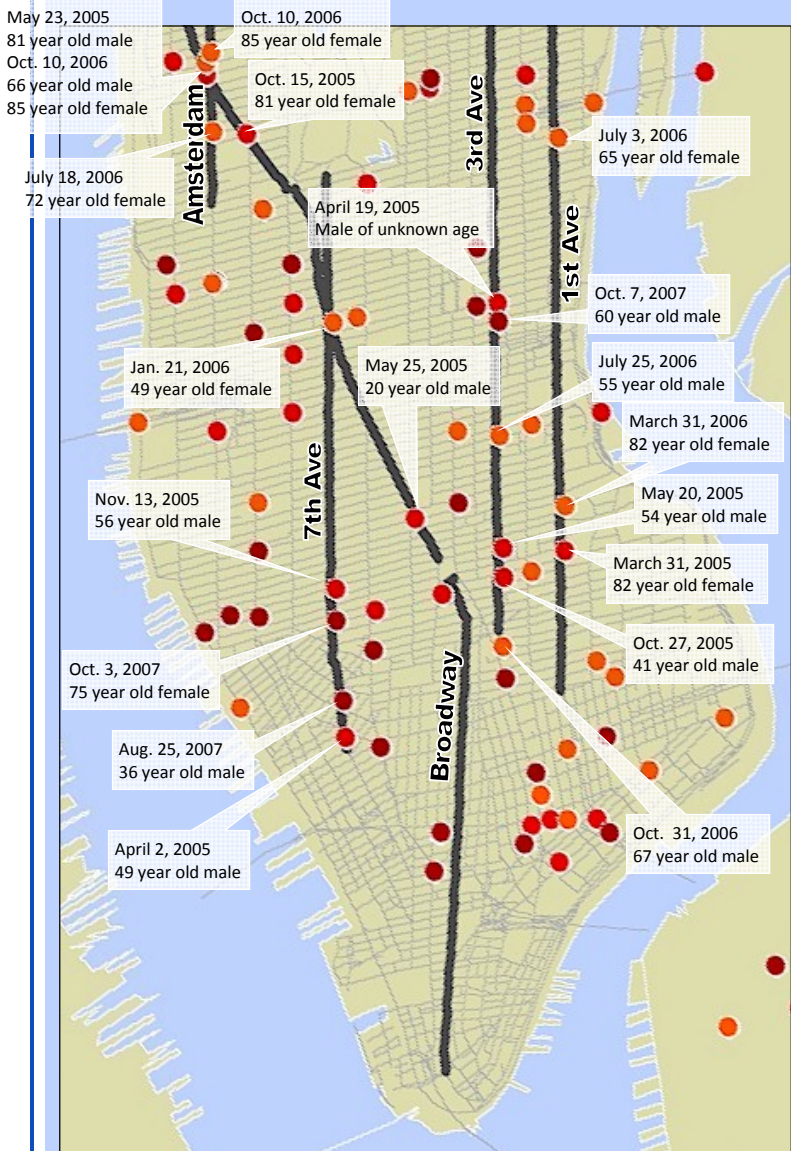
