# MOST DANGEROUS ROADS FOR WALKING

## Suffolk County

130 pedestrians were killed on Suffolk County roads in the three years from 2011 through 2013. Tri-State Transportation Campaign's analysis of federal traffic fatality data reveals that Route 25 (Middle Country Road, Jericho Turnpike, Main Road), Route 110 (New York Avenue, Broadhollow Road, Broadway), Route 27A (Main Street, Montauk Highway, CR-85, CR-80), Route 25A (East Main Street, Fort Salonga Road), Route 27 (Sunrise Highway, CR-39, Montauk Highway) and Route 454 (Veterans Memorial Highway) had the highest number of pedestrian deaths over the period studied.
