

Atlantic County's Most Dangerous Roads for Bicyclists

From 2001 to 2010, 8,281 bicyclists were involved in accidents in eight Southern New Jersey counties (Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Ocean and Salem). During this period, there were 63 bicyclist fatalities.

Between 2001 and 2010, 1,429 bicyclists in Atlantic County were in accidents. Thirteen bicyclists were killed in these crashes. Based on crash rate, Atlantic County is the second most dangerous Southern New Jersey county for bicyclists.

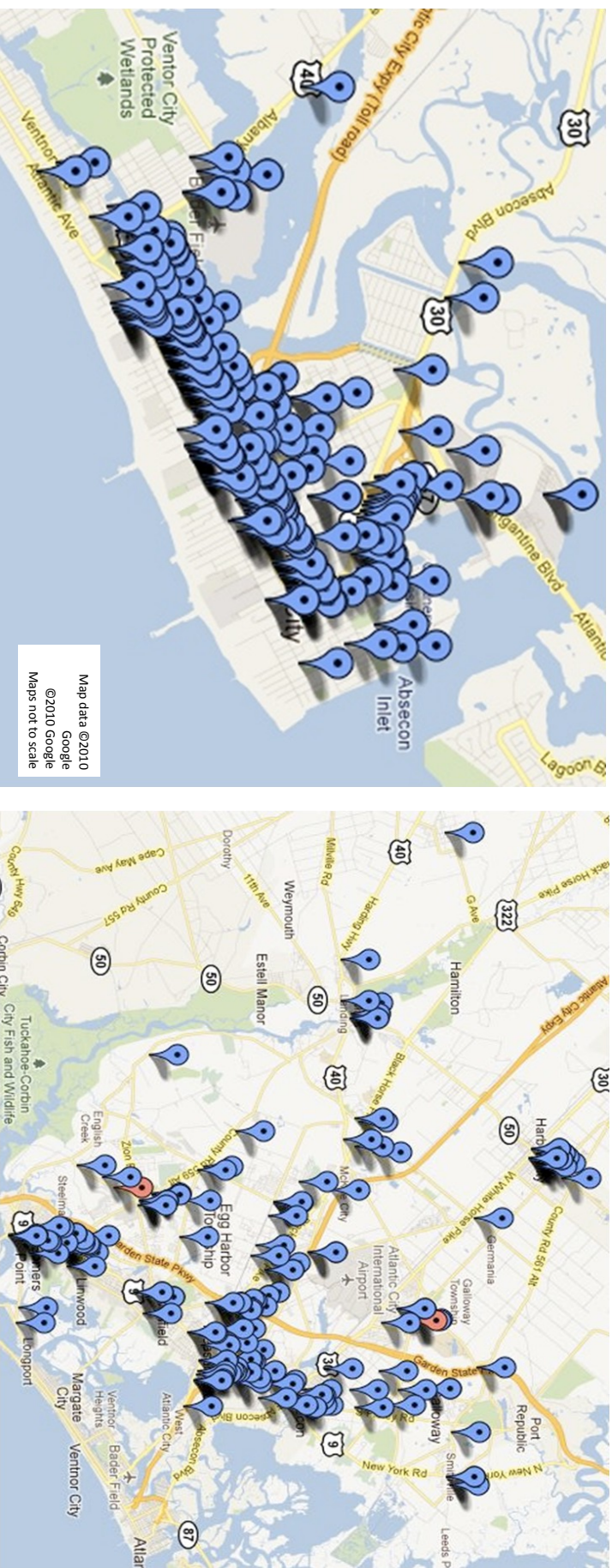
In Atlantic County, 426 bicyclists were in accidents between 2008 and 2010. The Tri-State Transportation Campaign's analysis of statewide crash records revealed that Atlantic Avenue (61 bicyclists in accidents), US 30/White Horse Pike/Absecon Blvd (34 bicyclists in accidents) and US 40 (25 bicyclists in accidents) were the three most dangerous roads for bicyclists in Atlantic County during this period.
