

# Camden County's Most Dangerous Roads for Bicyclists

From 2001 to 2010, 8,281 bicyclists were involved in accidents in eight Southern New Jersey counties (Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Ocean and Salem). During this period, there were 63 bicyclist fatalities.

Between 2001 and 2010, 1,778 bicyclists in Camden County were in accidents. Eleven bicyclists were killed in these crashes. Based on crash rate, Camden County is the fifth most dangerous Southern New Jersey county for bicyclists.

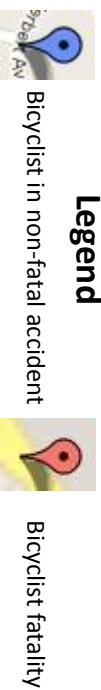
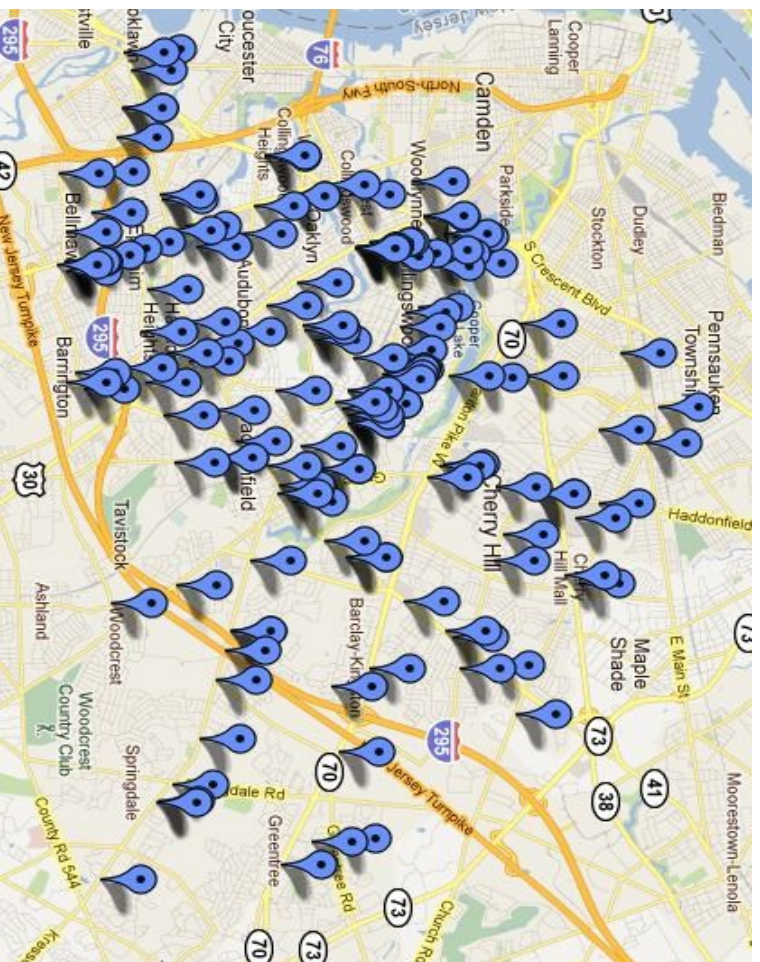
In Camden County, 516 bicyclists were in accidents between 2008 and 2010. The Tri-State Transportation Campaign's analysis of statewide crash records revealed that US 30/White Horse Pike (31 bicyclists in accidents), NJ 168/Black Horse Pike (27 bicyclists in accidents) and Route 561/Haddon Avenue (23 bicyclists in accidents) were the three most dangerous roads for bicyclists in Camden County during this period.

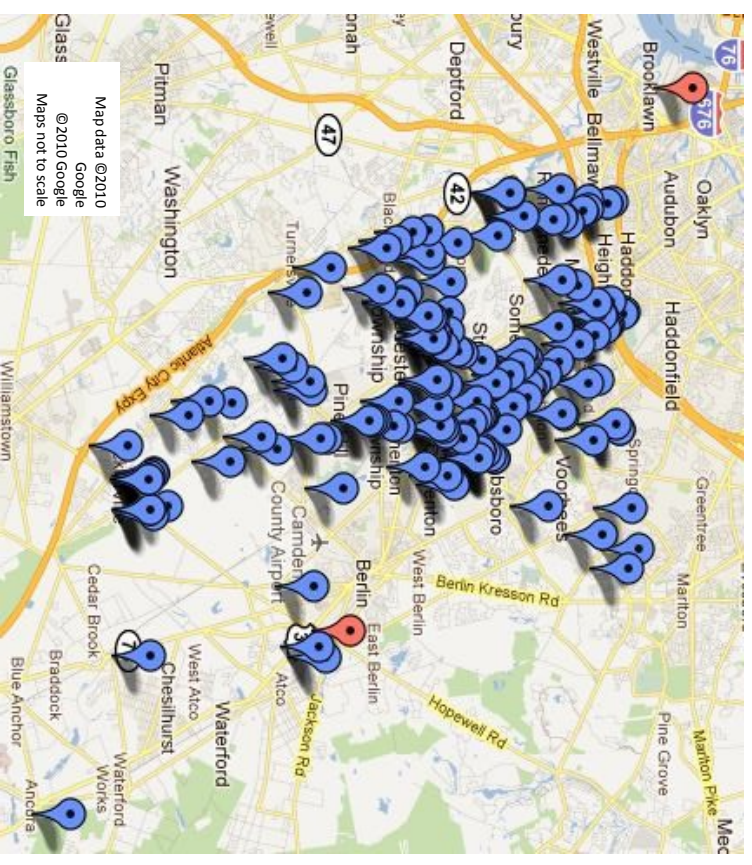


# Bicyclists in Accidents in Camden County, 2008-2010
